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Welcome to Worship!

Today we celebrate the most important event in human history – that God raised Jesus from the dead! And if God can do that, then God has the power and the love to do absolutely anything for those who love God and are called according to God's purpose. When we come to know how much God loves us, we are able to let go of fear and live by faith, not knowing what our future holds, but only that the God who holds our future loves us with a love that shines light in the darkness, that breaks the power of sin, and that brings life out of death.

Salem is still recommending masks. We know that some are only comfortable coming into a place where people are masked, and we want to provide an environment where everyone feels safe. While it is true that Covid case numbers are down, much of that is due to those who can afford to self-test not reporting positive results and due to those who cannot afford to self-test finding it more difficult to find free testing sites. New England is expecting a new surge in covid cases and Holy Week and Easter services certainly have the potential of contributing to that if we do not exercise caution. While the current variants may cause only mild symptoms in most people, those who are older and who have underlying conditions remain at risk for more serious illness, including long covid. We will continue to re-evaluate based on what happens with the pandemic and what the latest advice is concerning singing protocols.

They have also offered us the former music director's office for Pastor Marjo and Karl to share, half of the workroom behind what will now be their church office for such things as our copier, printers, router, and file cabinets, a section of the paper supply closet in the workroom, storage for larger items in one of the closets off the stage, as well as a temporary "staging area" in the former food pantry space for things we will be moving off-site to long-term storage. First Presbyterian in Fairfield has also made us an offer. This is a chance for you, the congregation, to choose where you wish to worship.

Our Wednesday Evening Bible Study will resume this week in a novel way! The members of CCITCAY (the characters from our Virtual Dinner Theatre Lenten Experience, "Looking for the Joy in Lent") will return to share with us how the revival that began in their congregation has led them to a study on the book of Acts — which is exactly what we are studying! So please join us at 6:30 on zoom for a short reader's theatre and a discussion of how God has been using Acts 1-2 to transform our lives during this Lenten season. At 7:15 we will share in Communion and then have some time to catch up with each other.

A READING FROM THE NEW TESTAMENT: Acts 10:34-43

Peter began to speak to [the people]: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ — he is Lord of all! That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. A READING FROM THE GOSPELS: Luke 24:1-12

On the first day of the week, at early dawn, [the women] came to the tomb, taking the spices that they had prepared. They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, but when they went in, they did not find the body. While they were perplexed about this, suddenly two men in dazzling clothes stood beside them. The women were terrified and bowed their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen. Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee, that the Son of Man must be handed over to sinners, and be crucified, and on the third day rise again." Then they remembered his words, and returning from the tomb, they told all this to the eleven and to all the rest. Now it was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the other women with them who told this to the apostles. But these words seemed to them an idle tale, and they did not believe them. But Peter got up and ran to the tomb; stooping and looking in, he saw the linen cloths by themselves; then he went home, amazed at what had happened.

UPCOMING COMMEMORATIONS

Olavus Petri, priest, died 1552; Laurentius Petri, Bishop of Uppsala, died 1573; renewers of the church Tuesday, April 19, 2022

These two brothers studied with Luther at the University of Wittenberg and then returned to their native Sweden to introduce the Lutheran reforms. Olavus published a catechism and hymnal; Laurentius was a professor who defended the office of bishop and later became one.

Anselm, Bishop of Canterbury, died 1109 Thursday, April 21, 2022

This eleventh-century monk was one of the greatest theologians of the Middle Ages. He is remembered for emphasizing the maternal aspects of God, and for the theory that the Son of God became human in order to make the necessary payment for our sin.

Day of the Creation (Día de la Creación) Friday, April 22, 2022

This observance invites us to notice & give God thanks for the wonders of the created universe. As stewards of that creation, we are also challenged to be careful in our use of it.

Toyohiko Kagawa, renewer of society, died 1960 Saturday, April 23, 2022

Born in Kobe, Japan, Kagawa was orphaned as a young child. Later, when he became Christian, he was disowned by the rest of his family. Wishing to bring Christian principles into society, he worked among poor people, established schools and hospitals, and worked for peace.

The week will culminate with a 2day event in the heart of the city with worship that includes topnotch Christian musical groups and evangelist Andrew Palau preaching. And in addition to worship, there will be fellowship opportunities including Action Sports and a Family Fun Zone! Through our participation in this event God gives us 2 exciting opportunities – to build bridges which strengthen the work of all of our congregations in the Grater Bridgeport area and to invite family and friends to join us in a worship event unlike any we have seen in the area for years.

While serving people – feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, housing the homeless, welcoming the stranger, etc. – is a vital part of our Christian faith, it is only half of our call. You don't have to be a Christian to help those in need. And if all we Christians do is serve in silence, then those we serve will never hear about the amazing God we know and love.

That's why the Luis Palau Association brings congregations to do both – to serve God through both Word and Deed. While bringing friends to CityFest could change their lives, such an experience is often just the first step in the journey.
