Seeking God's Will

"Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it." [1 Corinthians 12:27]

"Christ is the head of the body, the church" [Colossians 1:18]

In 2020 the congregation voted to sell the building to a developer. The more we dealt with him, the more I was convinced that he was lying and that it was a bad idea to sell to him. And so on 2 successive Sundays in worship I prayed these words, "God, if it is your will for this sale to go through, make it go through quickly and easily. But if you do not want us to sell, make that crystal clear to us". We signed the purchase and sales agreement, but when we got the rent back agreement the man had tripled the rent and wasn't going to provide any of the services that he had promised! At that point, Frank Dukenski told the Council that he had withdrawn the agreement to sell. He said, "I know I might not actually have had the authority to do that, but it was crystal clear that that's what we needed to do." And I praised God for answering my prayer!

In December of 2021, the congregation of Salem Lutheran Church again voted in a specially called meeting to sell our property - this time to the Ephraim French Seventh Day Adventist Church for 1.8 million dollars. To be honest, I wasn't convinced we should sell the property and so I prayed, "God, if you don't want us to sell the property, you will have to stop it because I can't." Immediately I had a vision of a train barreling down the track and I heard God say, "Don't stand in front of the train. You'll just get run over. Instead, trust the One who controls the tracks." A few months later I was in Barbados when I got the email announcing the congregational meeting to vote to sell. As I read the email on my phone, my heart heavy, I just happened to be riding a steam train on a plantation we were touring. Suddenly the train slowed down and the tour guide said, "You may have wondered why we've slowed down, but if you look out that window over there, you will see one of our guys has jumped off and is running over there to switch the tracks"!!! And I knew it was God saying to me, "Don't worry! You can see that I am obviously controlling the tracks!" We got back home, the congregation voted to sell, but I was still sad -- until I met the people from the purchasing church, that is. We asked them if we might rent back a small classroom on the lower level for Karl and me to share for a few months. Their response was, "Why would you want to do that? Why don't you move into that rear office upstairs?" They were referring to Liz's old one - the second best office in the whole building! At that point I KNEW that selling to these gracious, loving people had been the right thing to do!

They invited us to stay and offered us all the worship, office and storage space we need at a very reasonable price. First Presbyterian Church in Fairfield also made us an offer that gives us about half the space (office not handicapped accessible) for more money and yet our leadership currently is set on going there. To me it makes no sense from a business point of view. Plus I know that there are many Salem members who will not move there with us which is an even greater concern.

And so, since we had two different offers and since our membership was

divided on the issue, I wasn't sure whether Karl and I would be in the new office for just a few months, or whether we would be there indefinitely. I needed to know, because if it was going to be long-term, the office needed some work since it had not been updated since Ann and Bill Martin fixed it up when Liz became full-time 35-40 years ago! I turned to God in prayer and I asked God to give me a sign as to whether I should fix it up or not. And God gave me that sign. Now to understand that sign, you need to remember what I have mentioned to you before - that the clearest message God has ever given me was that someday I would be doing some sort of ministry in Jamaica, so keep that in mind. The wallpaper was falling off the wall and I was thinking that IF I were to fix up the office, I'd like a gold color, and I found 2 colors I liked on the Home Depot site. When I clicked on the new colors I discovered what they were named. They could have been named a thousand different things, but what these 2 colors were named were... PLANTAIN and GINGER BEER! And then I KNEW WITHOUT A SINGLE DOUBT that God was telling me to fix up the office and settle in for the long-term. So of course, I did!

Salem's Council, however, wants to begin worshipping at First Presbyterian in May and move our offices there in September.

Here's the thing. While the Church is NOT the building, the Church is NOT merely the people either. We are all members of the body of Christ, connected with one another. But we ONLY function as a healthy body when we are under the direction of Christ our Head. If we are not listening to the Head, we are NOT the Church – we are simply a religious club or a social clique.

In order to give every member the opportunity to vote on what they believe God is calling us to do – to stay at 3160 Park Avenue or to move to the First Presbyterian Church in Fairfield – I have called a congregational meeting for Sunday after Easter, April 24th, immediately following worship, at approximately 10:30 am. Because of the difficulty we have had zooming people into congregational meetings, the meeting will be IN-PERSON only. The ballot will be a written one, so that you can freely vote your conscience.

I ask that each and every member ask Christ what HE wants for Salem. And when you pray, ask that God make the answer crystal clear to you so that you know that it is not your will, but God's. I also ask that each and every member come & vote so that the whole body of Christ at Salem is together. If you have any questions or concerns, please call or text me at 203-982-3441.



"Know Your Numbers": Body Mass Index and Waist Circumference

Body mass index (BMI) is a measure of body fat based on height and weight that applies to adult men and women. A BMI below 18.5 is underweight. A BMI of 18.5-24.9 is normal. A BMI of 25-29.9 is overweight and any BMI over 30 is obesity. The higher your BMI the higher your risk for certain diseases such as heart disease, high blood pressure, type 2 diabetes, gallstones, breathing problems, and certain cancers. Waist Circumference measurement helps screen for possible health risks that come with overweight and obesity. If most of your fat is around your waist you're at a higher risk for heart disease and type 2 diabetes. This risk goes up with a waist size that is greater than 35 inches for women or greater than 40 inches for men.

"Know Your Numbers": Blood Pressure

High blood pressure, sometimes called "the silent killer," is very common. You can have high blood pressure and still feel just fine because high blood pressure often does not cause signs of illness that you can see or feel. One way to find out if you have high blood pressure is to have your blood pressure screened. Your blood pressure is high when it measures 140/90 or higher. You have prehypertension when your blood pressure is between 120/80 and 139/89. Normal blood pressure is less than 119/79. If you have high blood pressure it is very important to see a doctor. Uncontrolled high blood pressure can lead to stroke, heart disease, eye problems, kidney failure, and other health problems. "Know Your Numbers": Blood Cholesterol

Cholesterol is a waxy, fat-like substance which circulates in your blood stream. The liver removes the cholesterol from your body. Too much cholesterol in your blood, over 200mg/dl, is called high blood cholesterol. It can be serious. It increases your chances of having a heart attack or getting heart disease. High blood cholesterol itself does not cause symptoms; so many people don't know that they have it. It is important to find out what your cholesterol numbers are because if you have high blood cholesterol, lowering it reduces your chances of getting heart disease or having a heart attack. "Know Your Numbers": Blood Sugar

Diabetes means your blood glucose (sugar) is too high. Glucose comes from the food you eat and is also made in your liver and muscles. Insulin is a chemical (a hormone) made by the pancreas. Insulin helps the glucose from food get into your cells. If your body does not make enough insulin or if the insulin doesn't work the way it should, glucose can't get into your cells. It stays in your blood instead. Fasting blood glucose is taken in the morning after not eating for at least 8 hours. Diabetes is a fasting blood glucose level of 126 or higher. Prediabetes is fasting blood glucose of 100-125 and normal fasting blood glucose is under 99. Diabetes that is not well controlled causes serious damage to the eyes, kidneys, nerves, and heart, gums and teeth.

This Info Could Save Your Life

- 1. Let's say it's 7:25 pm and you're going home (alone of course) after an unusually hard day on the job.
- You're really tired, upset and frustrated.
- 3. Suddenly you start experiencing severe pain in your chest that starts to drag out into your arm and up into your jaw.

You are only about five km from the hospital nearest your home.

- 4. Unfortunately you don't know if you'll be able to make it that far.
- 5. You have been trained in CPR, but the guy that taught the course did not tell you how to perform it on yourself.

6. HOW TO SURVIVE A HEART ATTACK WHEN ALONE?

Since many people are alone when they suffer a heart attack without help, the person whose heart is beating improperly and who begins to feel faint, has only about 10 seconds left before losing consciousness.

7. However, these victims can help themselves by coughing repeatedly and very vigorously. A deep breath should be taken before each cough, and the cough must be deep and prolonged, as when producing sputum from deep inside the chest.

A breath and a cough must be repeated about every two seconds without let-up until help arrives, or until the heart is felt to be beating normally again.

- 8. Deep breaths get oxygen into the lungs and coughing movements squeeze the heart and keep the blood circulating. The squeezing pressure on the heart also helps it to regain a normal rhythm. In this way, heart attack victims can get help or to a hospital.
- 9. Tell as many other people as possible about this. It could save their lives!

The total cholesterol measurement along with blood pressure, blood sugar and body mass index (BMI) will allow you and your healthcare provider to determine your risk for developing cardiovascular disease caused by atherosclerosis.

Total Cholesterol	Less than 180 mg/dL
Body Mass Index	Less than 25 kg/m2
Blood Pressure	Less than 120/80 mm Hg
Fasting Blood Sugar	Less than 100 mg/dL

Accompaniment in a time of crisis

Lutheran Disaster Response raises \$1.3 million for care efforts in Eastern Europe

On Feb. 24, Russian forces invaded Ukraine, initiating a humanitarian crisis. Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR) is accompanying ELCA companion churches and ecumenical partners in their efforts to provide support, supplies and care to people affected by the war. So far, LDR's Eastern Europe crisis response has raised \$1.3 million.

According to the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, Filippo Grandi, more than 2 million people are seeking refuge in neighboring countries, including Hungary, Poland, Slovakia, Romania and Moldova. There are major humanitarian concerns for both internally displaced people and refugees.

Russia has launched air strikes across Ukraine, including on the capital of Kyiv and other major cities. Airports are shut down, and few railway lines are operational. At least 636 civilians have been killed in the conflict to date, and damage to civilian infrastructure has left hundreds of thousands of people without water or electricity. Ukrainian men of military age (18-60) are forbidden to leave the country, so most of those fleeing the violence are women and children.

Through the Lutheran World Federation (LWF), LDR is supporting member churches including the German Evangelical Lutheran Church of Ukraine, the Evangelical Church of the Augsburg Confession in Poland, the Evangelical Church of the Augsburg Confession in Slovakia, the Evangelical Church of the Augsburg Confession in Romania and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Romania.

These churches are distributing basic necessities such as food, water and toiletries, as well as providing pastoral and psychological care and assisting members of Roma communities

and foreign nationals. Additional responses through partners in these countries and others in the region are expected in the coming weeks and months.

A grant to some of these companion churches through the LWF was approved March 9. This grant will allow LWF over a six-month period to establish a coordination structure to support member churches in the response. Through it, the LWF will strengthen the capacity of member churches to fulfill the immediate and long-term needs of refugees and internally displaced people, and to report back to partners effectively.

"Covenant of the smaller Lutheran churches in central and Eastern Europe, ecumenical and other partners has long been a regional priority for the ELCA," said Elizabeth A. Eaton, presiding bishop of the ELCA, in a message. "In this time of crisis, we accompany our partners with concrete support for their humanitarian efforts through Lutheran Disaster Response."

Eaton continued, "The ECLA is also accompanying those who are responding to the needs of foreign nationals who were in Ukraine when the fighting began and who are trying to cross the border to safety, as well as the partners who focused their ministry on providing holistic support for under-documented and undocumented individuals impacted by this violence in Ukraine."

Prayers for Christians in the Middle East

The Middle East and North Africa Desk asks the ELCA to pray for Christians in the Middle East who are suffering. Until recently, Christians in the Middle East were a robust minority community with long histories and deep interfaith relationships, but in some countries the wars of the 21st century have reduced the number of Christians to single percentages. Decades of conflict, the weakness of financial institutions and governments, and this year's repudiation of a "two-state" solution for Israel and Palestine have driven a mass exodus of Christians from the region. Church leaders in the Middle East are speaking of a Kairos moment, deeply concerned for the future of their churches and of Christian witness in the Middle East.

Seeking the Safety and Viability of Christian Communities in the Middle East

The ELCA's Global Mission unit works with Christians in the Middle East to build leadership capacity, provide relief to refugees, support strategies for sustainable Christian communities, and strengthen Arab Christian awareness in the West. Global Mission supports its companion churches in their efforts to witness publicly and to provide their members with a safe and viable future in the region.

Though bilateral support, historically, has gone to the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land (ELCJHL), the ELCA now provides World Hunger support to Christians and others in need throughout the region through ecumenical organizations such as the Middle East Council of Churches (MECC) in Beirut and the Coptic Evangelical Organization for Social Services in Cairo. The ELCA also provides Mission Support to Arabic-speaking seminaries in the Middle East, namely the Near East School of Theology in Beirut and the Evangelical Theological Seminary in Cairo.

The displacement of millions of people in the Middle East makes "people on the move" the focus of the ELCA's action for refugees, migrants and internally displaced people. Support to the Middle East has mainly been administered through such agencies as the Middle East Council of Churches, Lutheran World Federation, Lutheran World Relief, St. Andrew's Refugee Services in Cairo, and the ELCJHL.
