Except for a brief light rain shower one Sunday that sent folks scurrying under trees or to their cars for jackets and had Bruce creating an entirely new liturgical role – that of Umbrella Holder over pastor and the sound equipment! – we were blessed with delightful weather. Now that we are worshipping indoors we hope all Salem members and friends will join us – both those who have loved worshipping in the grove and those for whom indoor worship is more manageable.

As we move to indoor worship, we remind everyone that masks are now optional, and that we encourage people to do be good stewards of their own health as well as good neighbors who look out for the health of others. A READING FROM THE NEW TESTAMENT: 2 Timothy 1:1-14

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, for the sake of the promise of life that is in Christ Jesus, To Timothy, my beloved child: Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord.

I am grateful to God — whom I worship with a clear conscience, as my ancestors did — when I remember you constantly in my prayers night and day. Recalling your tears, I long to see you so that I may be filled with joy. I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, lives in you. For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, and for this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day what I have entrusted to him. Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. Guard the good treasure entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.

As amazing as it was, CityFest was not the ultimate event, but rather the “launch party” for CityServe, a massive effort to mobilize churches to serve our region's greatest needs, providing support for those needing Adoption & Foster Care, better Education, and freedom from Food Insecurity. It includes a series of outreach events strategically designed to share the love of Jesus with key groups of people in our community, including university students, business/civic leaders, women, and those who are incarcerated. Following CityFest, Pastor Marjo was one of 6 pastors invited to attend the Mayor’s State of the City Address which was held on Wednesday. After hearing about all the amazing economic developments taking place in Bridgeport, Pastor Marjo told the mayor he needs someone to do a better job of spreading the good news! It seems that, thanks to the Hartford Healthcare Amphitheatre, Bridgeport is well on its way to becoming the Entertainment Capitol of Connecticut – in a much healthier way than a casino would have ever provided. And among the dozens of other initiatives cited were Bridgeport Landing Development, Honey Locust Square, Northsails, Congress Plaza, Windward Commons, Wakeman Boys and Girls Club, the redevelopment of the old coal plant, and the purchase of the Sikorsky airport and its promised expansion by the state. *But what was really exciting was to hear some of the pastors share afterwards about the prayer gathering that took place 6 years ago on the very site on which we were standing, the prayers that were offered up for Bridgeport, and the answers to those prayers that we are now seeing. Thanks be to God!*

Thank you to all who prayed for the Mayor’s Prayer Breakfast on September 12th! Pastor Marjo was one of over 60 pastors in Bridgeport who gathered in the mayor’s office to meet the mayor’s staff (3 of whom are pastors!), hear their prayer requests, and then join hands and hearts as we lifted our voices in prayer and praise for all that God has done, is doing and will do here in Bridgeport.

NEXT Choir rehearsals will resume after worship on Sunday October 16^h and continue on 10/16, 10/23, and 10/30. as we prepare to sing on Reformation Sunday, October 30th and All Saints Sunday, November 6th. After a break on November 6th and 13th, they will resume on 11/ 20 as we prepare for Christmas Eve.

Francis of Assisi, renewer of the church, died 1226

Tuesday, October 4, 2022

Born into the family of a wealthy merchant,
Francis gave up his inheritance to serve poor people.
He formed the Order of Friars Minor (called Franciscans),
who took on poverty and the task of preaching.
Francis had a spirit of gratitude for all of God's creation.

Theodor Fliedner, renewer of society, died 1864

Tuesday, October 4, 2022

Fliedner helped to bring about a revival of the ministry of deaconesses among Lutherans.
He was influenced in this by Moravian deaconesses he had met.
The motherhouse he founded in Kaiserswerth, Germany,
inspired many around the world to take up this ministry.

William Tyndale, translator, martyr, died 1536

Thursday, October 6, 2022

Tyndale was ordained a priest in England, and wished to translate the Bible into English.
He was opposed in this by King Henry VIII, causing him to flee to Germany.
He completed the New Testament in 1525,
but before he could finish the Old Testament, he was tried for heresy and burned at the stake.

Henry Melchior Muhlenberg, pastor in North America, died 1787

Friday, October 7

Divided Lutherans in America asked leaders in Europe
to send someone who could take charge and unite their work.
Muhlenberg was sent, and was effective in organizing the American Lutherans.
Among other accomplishments,
his liturgical principles became the basis for the Common Service of 1888,
which in turn was the basis for the Common Service Book and Hymnal of 1958,
used until the Lutheran Book of Worship was published in 1978.
