In the presence of God, who gives life to all things, and of Christ Jesus, who in his testimony before Pontius Pilate made the good confession, I charge you to keep the commandment without spot or blame until the manifestation of our Lord Jesus Christ, which he will bring about at the right time — he who is the blessed and only Sovereign, the King of kings and Lord of lords. It is he alone who has immortality and dwells in unapproachable light, whom no one has ever seen or can see; to him be honor and eternal dominion. Amen.

As for those who in the present age are rich, command them not to be haughty, or to set their hopes on the uncertainty of riches, but rather on God who richly provides us with everything for our enjoyment. They are to do good, to be rich in good works, generous, and ready to share, thus storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of the life that really is life.

A READING FROM THE GOSPELS: Luke 16:19-31

[Jesus said:] "There was a rich man who was dressed in purple and fine linen and who feasted sumptuously every day. And at his gate lay a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who longed to satisfy his hunger with what fell from the rich man's table; even the dogs would come and lick his sores. The poor man died and was carried away by the angels to be with Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried. In Hades, where he was being tormented, he looked up and saw Abraham far away with Lazarus by his side. He called out, 'Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue; for I am in agony in these flames'. But Abraham said, 'Child, remember that during your lifetime you received your good things, and Lazarus in like manner evil things; but now he is comforted here, and you are in agony. He said to him, 'If they do not listen to Moses and the prophets, neither will they be convinced even if someone rises from the dead'."

It includes a series of outreach events strategically designed to share the love of Jesus with key groups of people in our community, including university students, business/civic leaders, women, and those who are incarcerated. Following CityFest, Pastor Marjo was one of 6 pastors invited to attend the Mayor's State of the City Address which was held on Wednesday. After hearing about all the amazing economic developments taking place in Bridgeport, Pastor Marjo told the mayor he needs someone to do a better job of spreading the good news! It seems that, thanks to the Hartford Healthcare Amphitheatre, Bridgeport is well on its way to becoming the Entertainment Capitol of Connecticut – in a much healthier way than a casino would have ever provided. And among the dozens of other initiatives cited were Bridgeport Landing Development, Honey Locust Square, Northsails, Congress Plaza, Windward Commons, Wakeman Boys and Girls Club, the redevelopment of the old coal plant, and the purchase of the Sikorsky airport and its promised expansion by the state. But what was really exciting was to hear some of the pastors share afterwards about the prayer gathering that took place 6 years ago on the very site on which we were standing, the prayers that were offered up for Bridgeport, and the answers to those prayers that we are now seeing. Thanks be to God!

Thank you to all who prayed for the Mayor's Prayer Breakfast last Monday! Pastor Marjo was one of over 60 pastors in Bridgeport who gathered in the mayor's office to meet the mayor's staff (3 of whom are pastors!), hear their prayer requests, and then join hands and hearts as we lifted our voices in prayer and praise for all that God has done, is doing and will do here in Bridgeport.
