

**This Sunday** and next are the last 2 Sundays in the Church's liturgical year, as November  $27^{\text{th}}$  is the first Sunday in Advent. The readings for these last Sundays, and indeed on into Advent, focus on the end times. Some say that because of the state of the world, we must be in the end times now, but humans have been saying that for hundreds and thousands of years. No one except God – not even Jesus – knows when the last day will be, so it could be tomorrow or it could be thousands of years from now. What we do know is that our days as individuals are numbered. Our lives here on earth will end. Again, we don't know when that day will be. It could be today or decades from now. What we do know is that despite all the evil that surrounds us – climate change, war, violence, racism, pandemics, hunger, and poverty, to name just a few – God calls us to live with faith and hope and joy, as we are empowered by the Spirit to follow in the Way of Jesus – proclaiming the good news in word and deed. As the apostle Paul says, "Do not be weary in doing what is right".

#### **VETERANS' DAY OBSERVANCE WITH PRAYERS FOR PEACE**

November 11<sup>th</sup>, Veterans' Day in the U.S., has its roots in Armistice Day, the commemoration of the end of World War I, and has come to be an occasion to remember those who have served in our armed forces.
Today we also recognize those veterans among us here at Salem whose service has preserved the freedom of religion we enjoy in this country: Dave Albers, Joe Bales, Dick Bellows, Mike Caragol, Al DeWalt, Rich Kenyon, Steve Kuczo, Rich Lansing, Tom Larson, Jim McWain, Bob Reichelt, Nick Roberts & Bruce Tomasko.
Veterans' Day is also an appropriate occasion for prayer and reflection on peacemaking since those who have americaned wan first hand.

since those who have experienced war first-hand have much to teach about the real nature of war, as opposed to the images that predominate in films, television, and video games. History shows that in crises, military officers who have seen combat are less likely to recommend military action than politicians who do not have that experience. Veterans are often at the forefront of reconciliation efforts in war-torn regions.

November 11<sup>th</sup> is also the commemoration day of St. Martin of Tours, a 4<sup>th</sup> century Roman army officer who renounced violence when he became a "soldier for Christ".

 St. Martin's Day also recalls the peacemaking witness of other Martin namesakes: Martin Luther, who was baptized on November 11<sup>th</sup>, and whose theology of the cross calls for radical repentance; Martin Luther King, Jr.; and Martin Niemoller (World War I veteran, German pastor, and non-violent opponent of the Nazis in World War II).

Lutheran Peace Fellowship invites Lutherans to observe November 11<sup>th</sup> as a day of prayer and fasting for peace. Since 1985, the Veterans' Day fast has drawn the support of growing numbers of Lutherans in the United States and around the world.

Observances of the day have included all-day prayer and meditation retreats, campus prayer services, vigils at military installations, and Sunday "break-fast" communion services in Lutheran congregations. Here at Salem (which is the equivalent of Shalom, Salaam, and Peace), this call to peacemaking is embedded in our very name and identity.

But not a hair of your head will perish. By your endurance you will gain your souls."
