Welcome

We want you to feel safe so please know that we have 3 units of the best air cleaner on the market in the sanctuary. Also, you are most welcome to wear a mask at worship if you'd like.

Today we celebrate the feast of The Baptism of Our Lord, a second "epiphany" or "revealing" of Jesus as divine as well as human. Last week we celebrated the first "epiphany" as a star announced his birth and drew non-Jews from outside Israel to worship him. Today we celebrate Jesus' baptism in which the Holy Spirit appeared announcing Jesus as God's offspring, and proclaiming God's pleasure in him. As we hear the story, we reflect on what it means to "pass through the waters" and be baptized into the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ, receive the fire of the Holy Spirit, and be raised to a brand new life, completely different from ordinary human experience. The season of Epiphany will conclude on February 19th when we celebrate the Transfiguration of Our Lord, the third "epiphany" when it was revealed to Peter, James, and John that Jesus was God's beloved Son.

Please note that Pastor Marjo has prepared an Affirmation of Baptism take-home insert for you so that you may reaffirm your baptism as we remember the baptism of Jesus.

Today we commemorate the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., renewer of society, who was martyred in 1968. An American prophet of justice among races and nations, King was an eloquent preacher, a leader of the nonviolent resistance to race-segregated society, and recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964. Born on this date, he was assassinated on April 4, 1968.

We open our worship today with "Lift Every Voice and Sing", commonly known as the Black national anthem, as we recommit ourselves to our baptismal call "to work for justice and peace in all the world".

We invite you to observe Martin Luther King Day by joining in an ecumenical worship service tomorrow, January 16th, at 11:00 am, at Russell Temple, 555 Connecticut Avenue, sponsored by the Interdenominational Ministerial Association of Greater Bridgeport. A READING FROM THE NEW TESTAMENT: Acts 10:34-43

Peter began to speak to [Cornelius and his household]: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ — he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

A READING FROM THE GOSPELS: Matthew 3:13-17

You may stand if you so desire.

Then Jesus came from Galilee to John at the Jordan, to be baptized by him. John would have prevented him, saying, "I need to be baptized by you, and do you come to me?" But Jesus answered him, "Let it be so now; for it is proper for us in this way to fulfill all righteousness". Then he consented. And when Jesus had been baptized, just as he came up from the water, suddenly the heavens were opened to him and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and alighting on him. And a voice from heaven said, "This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased".

PLEASE JOIN THE SALEM'S WATER BOTTLE CHALLENGE to benefit the Council of Churches of Greater Bridgeport's Janus Center's school closet program! School children in Bridgeport public schools are in dire need of drinking water as drinking fountains have been dismantled due to Covid and also because of lead in the pipes. Our own Cindy Roberts has found a most cost-effective way to supply water – by the pallet! A pallet holds 84 cases, each holding 24 bottles for a total of 2,016 bottles. Cindy has negotiated the price down to \$6.12 (including the \$.10 deposit) = \$514.08/pallet. Salem delegates to the CCGB would like to challenge our congregation to raise enough funds to cover 1 pallet and then challenge other congregations to do the same. Please make checks payable to Salem and in the memo list "water bottles". UPCOMING COMMEMORATIONS

Antony of Egypt, renewer of the church, died around 356 Tuesday, January 17, 2023

One of the earliest of the Egyptian desert fathers, Antony gave away his sizeable inheritance and became a hermit. Later he became leader of a group of monks who devoted themselves to prayer, worship, and labor.

Pachomius, renewer of the church, died 346 Tuesday, January 17, 2023

Born in Egypt, Pachomius became a Christian while a soldier. He became a hermit (a solitary monk) and organized others into a religious community. His rule for monasteries influenced later ones in both the Eastern and Western churches.

Confession of Peter Wednesday, January 18, 2023

Today the church remembers the apostle Peter's great acknowledgement of Jesus as "the Christ, the Son of the living God."

This festival serves as a fitting beginning to the week in which we particularly pray that all Christians might be united in faith and witness.

Henry, Bishop of Uppsala, martyr, died 1156 Thursday, January 19, 2023

When Erik, King of Sweden, determined to invade Finland for the purpose of converting the people there to Christianity, Henry went with him.

Henry is recognized as the patron saint of Finland.

Agnes, martyr, died around 304 Saturday, January 21, 2023

Agnes was a girl of about thirteen living in Rome.

The details of her martyrdom are not clear,

but she gave witness to her faith and was put to death as a result, most likely by the sword.

The church has honored her as one of the chief martyrs of her time.
