Welcome to Worship!

We want you to feel safe so please know that we have 3 units of the best air cleaner on the market in the sanctuary. And we also have one running here in the lounge for when we have coffee hour or adult forums there. Also, you are most welcome to wear a mask at worship if you'd like.

Today, having celebrated Pentecost and Trinity Sunday, we move forward into the second half of the church year. The first half focused on who Jesus was and is, while this half focuses on what it means to be the Church. Though Jesus was a devout Jew who practiced his faith, he was criticized for eating with tax collectors and sinners — the religiously nonobservant. Jesus criticizes our self-righteousness and reminds us that the heart of our faith is to love God with all our heart and soul and mind and strength and to love our neighbors, even our enemies, as ourselves. Such love is not to come from a place of power and privilege, but from a place that sees the other person as someone we need as much as that other person needs us. Each and every one of us is as much in need of God's mercy as Matthew the tax collector or the hemorrhaging woman, or the ex-felon or the immigrant or the transgender person or the homeless person. As we gather each Lord's day we receive the healing that makes us well & sends us forth to be witnesses to God's love for the world.

After worship we will have an adult forum to discuss our visits to 4 different congregations and to listen attentively to God and lovingly to each other to discern if God is calling us to radical revitalization, to partnership merger, to consolidation merger, to holy closure, or to simply wait in patience for God to make known his will for us. Please join us in the lounge. Pastor Steven Wilco, Associate to the Bishop of the New England Synod will be there to help guide our conversation.

Our Wednesday Evening Bible Study continues at 7:00 on zoom as we study 1 Corinthians 1-4. The study is inspired by the book, <u>Basic Christian Leadership</u>: <u>Biblical Models of Church, Gospel and Ministry</u> by John Stott. Paul wrote to congregations who were facing challenges, and God is still speaking to us today through Paul's words. This week we'll begin looking at 1 Corinthians 3, in which Paul says that congregations can be immature or mature spiritually, and that there are 2 ways to determine which a congregation is – by their diet and by their behavior. What is our diet? How are we behaving? Where are we on the maturity scale as a congregation? **If you are interested in Salem's future, we do hope you will take this opportunity to join us!**

A READING FROM THE NEW TESTAMENT: Romans 4:13-25

¹³The promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. ¹⁴If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. ¹⁵For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

¹⁶For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, ¹⁷as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations") — in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. ¹⁸Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become "the father of many nations", according to what was said, "So numerous shall your descendants be." ¹⁹He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. ²⁰No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, ²¹being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. ²²Therefore his faith "was reckoned to him as righteousness". ²³Now the words, "it was reckoned to him", were written not for his sake alone, ²⁴but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, ²⁵who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

A READING FROM THE GOSPELS: Matthew 9:9-13, 18-26

⁹As Jesus was walking along, he saw a man called Matthew sitting at the tax booth; and he said to him, "Follow me." And he got up and followed him.

¹⁰And as he sat at dinner in the house, many tax collectors and sinners came and were sitting with him and his disciples. ¹¹When the Pharisees saw this, they said to his disciples, "Why does your teacher eat with tax collectors and sinners?" ¹²But when he heard this, he said, "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick. ¹³Go and learn what this means, 'I desire mercy, not sacrifice.' For I have come to call not the righteous but sinners."

¹⁸While he was saying these things to them, suddenly a leader of the synagogue came in and knelt before him, saying, "My daughter has just died; but come and lay your hand on her, and she will live." ¹⁹And Jesus got up and followed him, with his disciples. ²⁰Then suddenly a woman who had been suffering from hemorrhages for twelve years came up behind him and touched the fringe of his cloak, ²¹for she said to herself, "If I only touch his cloak, I will be made well." ²²Jesus turned, and seeing her he said, "Take heart, daughter; your faith has made you well." And instantly the woman was made well. ²³When Jesus came to the leader's house and saw the flute players and the crowd making a commotion, ²⁴he said, "Go away; for the girl is not dead but sleeping." And they laughed at him. ²⁵But when the crowd had been put outside, he went in and took her by the hand, and the girl got up. ²⁶And the report of this spread throughout that district.

Whatever your successes or failures in your Lenten or Easter disciplines, remember that the purpose is to establish NEW healthier habits of body, mind, heart and soul. And that's an ongoing task. If you've done well, continue! If you haven't, well, now we have the entire 6 months of the Pentecost season to try again!

You can remain silent and anonymous, ask for particular prayers, or offer your own prayers.

- **4.** Commit yourself to some new work of charity and one new work of justice. If you're not sure what to do, Pastor Marjo can offer suggestions.

UPCOMING COMMEMORATIONS

Barnabas, Apostle

Barnabas was not numbered among the 12 apostles, but the book of Acts gives him that title. After Paul was converted to Christianity, Barnabas welcomed him to Jerusalem, and later the two traveled together on missionary journeys.

Basil the Great, Bishop of Caesarea, died 379;

Gregory, Bishop of Nyssa, died around 385;

Gregory of Nazianzus	, Bishop of	Constantinople,	died around 389	;
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Macrina, teacher, died around 379

The Cappadocian fathers, as the 3 men in this group are known, explored the mystery of the Holy Trinity. Basil's monastic rule forms the basis for Eastern monastic life. Gregory of Nazianzus defended orthodox Christianity in Constantinople. Gregory of Nyssa, Basil's younger brother, wrote on the spiritual life. Macrina, older sister of Basil and Gregory of Nyssa,

was the leader of a community dedicated to asceticism, meditation, and prayer.

Emanuel Nine, martyrs, died 2015

On June 17, 2015, Clementa C. Pinckney, Cynthia Marie Graham Hurd, Susie Jackson, Ethel Lee Lance, DePayne Middleton-Doctor, Tywanza Sanders, Daniel Lee Simmons, Sharonda Coleman-Singleton, and Myra Thompson were murdered by a self-professed white supremacist while they were gathered for Bible study and prayer at the Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church (often referred to as Mother Emanuel) in Charleston, South Carolina. Prs Pinckney & Simmons both graduated from the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary. On August 8, 2019, a resolution to commemorate June 17 as a day of repentance for the martyrdom of the Emanuel Nine was adopted by the Churchwide Assembly of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. Congregations of the ELCA are encouraged to reaffirm their commitment to repenting of the sins of racism and white supremacy which continue to plague this church, to venerate the martyrdom of the Emanuel Nine, and to mark this day of penitence with study and prayer.


