Welcome to Worship!

We want you to feel safe so please know that we have 3 units of the best air cleaner on the market in the sanctuary. And we also have one running here in the lounge for when we have coffee hour or adult forums there. Also, you are most welcome to wear a mask at worship if you'd like.

On this Sixth Sunday after Pentecost, we are reminded once again that the mystery of God's ways is often hidden from the wise and intelligent. Jesus did not choose to associate with those who held power and prestige, but with those who were experiencing bigotry, discrimination, and oppression on a daily basis. Sadly the religious community of Jesus' day supported those in power and judged those who were powerless. The same is true today and Paul explains why this is so: we are bound by sin and cannot free ourselves from the evil that comes to steal, kill and destroy us. That is exactly why God sent Jesus, and why Jesus asked God to send the Spirit: so that the Spirit would lead us to life and to life abundant. When we cast our burdens upon the Lord, we find ourselves refreshed by Jesus' invitation: "Come to me, all who are weary". Gathered to worship the God of all power and love, we find rest for our souls.

Our Wednesday Evening Bible Study continues at 7:00 on zoom as we study 1 Corinthians 1-4. The study is inspired by the book, <u>Basic Christian Leadership</u>: <u>Biblical Models of Church</u>, <u>Gospel and Ministry</u> by John Stott. Paul wrote to congregations who were facing challenges, and God is still speaking to us today through Paul's words. This week we'll continue looking at 1 Corinthians 4, in which Paul discusses the role of church leaders If you are interested in Salem's future, we do hope you will take this opportunity to join us!

A READING FROM THE OLD TESTAMENT: Genesis 24:34-38, 42-49, 58-67

[Laban, Rebekah's brother, received a visitor who said,] ³⁴"I am Abraham's servant. ³⁵God has greatly blessed my master, and he has become wealthy; God has given him flocks and herds, silver and gold, male and female slaves, camels and donkeys. ³⁶And Sarah my master's wife bore a son to my master when she was old; and Gpd has given him all that he has. ³⁷My master made me swear, saying, 'You shall not take a wife for my son from the daughters of the Canaanites, in whose land I live; ³⁸but you shall go to my father's house, to my kindred, and get a wife for my son'.

⁴²"I came today to the spring, and said, 'O LORD, the God of my master Abraham, if now you will only make successful the way I am going! ⁴³I am standing here by the spring of water; let the young woman who comes out to draw, to whom I shall say, "Please give me a little water from your jar to drink", ⁴⁴and who will say to me, "Drink, and I will draw for your camels also" — let her be the woman whom the LORD has appointed for my master's son'.

⁴⁵"Before I had finished speaking in my heart, there was Rebekah coming out with her water jar on her shoulder; and she went down to the spring, and drew. I said to her, 'Please let me drink'. ⁴⁶She quickly let down her jar from her shoulder, and said, 'Drink, and I will also water your camels'. So I drank, and she also watered the camels. ⁴⁷Then I asked her, 'Whose daughter are you?' She said, 'The daughter of Bethuel, Nahor's son, whom Milcah bore to him'. So I put the ring on her nose, and the bracelets on her arms. ⁴⁸Then I bowed my head and worshiped the LORD, and blessed the LORD, the God of my master Abraham, who had led me by the right way to obtain the daughter of my master's kinsman for his son. ⁴⁹Now then, if you will deal loyally and truly with my master, tell me; and if not, tell me, so that I may turn either to the right hand or to the left."

⁵⁸And they called Rebekah, and said to her, "Will you go with this man?" She said, "I will". ⁵⁹So they sent away their sister Rebekah and her nurse along with Abraham's servant and his men. ⁶⁰And they blessed Rebekah and said to her, "May you, our sister, become thousands of myriads; may your offspring gain possession of the gates of their foes".

⁶¹Then Rebekah and her maids rose up, mounted the camels, and followed the man; thus the servant took Rebekah, and went his way.

⁶²Now Isaac had come from Beer-lahai-roi, and was settled in the Negeb. ⁶³Isaac went out in the evening to walk in the field; and looking up, he saw camels coming. ⁶⁴And Rebekah looked up, and when she saw Isaac, she slipped quickly from the camel, ⁶⁵and said to the servant, "Who is the man over there, walking in the field to meet us?" Benedict of Nursia, Abbot of Monte Cassino, died around 540 Tuesday, July 11, 2023

Benedict is known as the father of the Western monastic movement.

Educated in Rome, he went to live as a hermit,

and eventually gathered a community of monks around him.

He wrote a rule for living in monasteries that is used by Benedictines and adapted by others.

Nathan Söderblom, Bishop of Uppsala, died 1931 Wednesday, July 12, 2023

A winner of the Nobel Prize for peace for his efforts to unite peoples after the First World War, Söderblom also called attention to the revival of early church worship principles, and helped to lay the groundwork for the World Council of Churches.



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
