Welcome to Worship!

We want you to feel safe so please know that we have 2 units of the best air cleaner on the market in the sanctuary (the third is out for repair). There is also one running in the lounge for when we have worship, coffee hour, or adult forums there. Also, you are most welcome to wear a mask at worship if you'd like.

Stir up your power, and come! The psalmist's plea in Psalm 80:2 has become familiar to us in the Advent prayers. Isaiah wants God to rip the heavens open. Both cry out for an apparently distant, angry God to show up, to save, to restore. When we hear Jesus describing the coming of the Son of Man with stars falling from heaven, it can sound dire and horrible, not like anything we would ever hope for. But when we really look at the suffering of people God loves, we can share the hope that God would tear open the heavens and come.

We welcome Pastor Maria Hammons to preach and preside at worship today. A Special Congregational Meeting was held on 10/29 at which the congregation voted to close and Pastor Maria is here today in her role as Congregational Consultant for Holy Closure and Merger for the New England Synod. She met with our Executive & Finance Committees on 11/21, and with our Council on 11/27. Today she will meet with the congregation following worship to explain the process of dissolution which will begin in January. There are practical and legal procedures which must be followed, and as the synod leads us through these, we ask your patience and your prayers.

ADVENT WREATH CANDLELIGHTING

- Leader 1: Today is the first Sunday of Advent, the Sunday in which we recall the hope we have in Christ.
- Leader 2: The first candle in our Advent Wreath is the Candle of Hope to remind us that we can trust the One who fulfilled all of God's promises.
- Leader 1: The prophets of Israel all spoke of the coming of Christ, of how a savior would be born, a king in the line of David.

 They spoke of how he would rule the world wisely and bless all nations.

On Christmas day the Christ of our hope was born.

On Good Friday the Christ of our hope died.

On Easter day the Christ of our hope rose from the dead.

He then ascended into heaven.

On the last day, the Christ of our hope will come again to establish his kingdom over all things on earth.

While the Ephraim French Seventh Day Adventist Church that purchased the building from us wanted very much to start a food pantry, they were unable to get permission from CT Food Share who said there were too many pantries in the area. They and we kept praying. Meanwhile a food pantry to which members of our congregation used to deliver food closed, and they began delivering to the Bishop Jean Williams Food Pantry which operated out of a church on Worth St. Three years ago that church building was sold and purchased by Transforming Lives Church. While they knew that as their congregation grew they would eventually need all of the building, they agreed to allow the food pantry to stay for three years. As the end of that time period approached, the Bishop Jean Williams Food Pantry needed a new space. That's when we discovered how God had been using Salem to be an answer to our own prayers and those of the Ephraim French Seventh Day Adventist Church and the Bishop Jean Williams Food Pantry! The pantry is now renting space from the SDA church right here at 3160 Park Avenue! Because of how God has worked, over 500 families came by to pick up food the week of Thanksgiving, and food was delivered to an additional 200 families! Thanks be to God!

Francis Xavier, missionary to Asia, died 1552

Sunday, December 3

A native of the Basque region of Spain,

Xavier became a missionary to India, Southeast Asia, Japan, and the Philippines.

He also helped to found the Society of Jesus (Jesuits).

John of Damascus, theologian and hymnwriter, died around 749 Monday, December 4

A monk in an abbey near Jerusalem, John wrote many hymns as well as theological works.

One of his works, The Fount of Wisdom, remained influential for centuries.

Nicholas, Bishop of Myra, died around 342

Wednesday, December 6

Little is known about Nicholas, except that he was a bishop in present-day Turkey.

According to legend, he was famous for his giving to the poor, and so has become a symbol of anonymous gift-giving.

Ambrose, Bishop of Milan, died 397

Thursday, December 7

While a governor of northern Italy,

Ambrose was elected bishop of Milan on the same day he was baptized.

He was a famous preacher, a writer of hymns we still sing today, and helped lead St. Augustine to faith.
