

Welcome to Worship!

We want you to feel safe so please know that we have 3 units of the best air cleaner on the market in the sanctuary. (A big thank you to Bill Winter for getting our 3rd one repaired!). There is also one running in the lounge for when we have worship, coffee hour, or adult forums there. Also, you are most welcome to wear a mask at worship if you'd like.

The third Sunday in Advent is known as Jubilate (or Rejoice) Sunday, and one symbol of this is the lighting of a pink candle on our Advent wreath instead of the traditional purple (which signifies penitence) or the more contemporary blue ones. "Rejoice always", begins the reading from 1 Thessalonians. Isaiah and the psalmist make clear that God is turning our mourning into dancing and shouts of joy. "All God's children got a robe", go the words of a spiritual. It is not so much a stately, formal, pressed outfit as it is a set of party clothes, but clothes we can't wait to wear! We receive that robe when we are baptized and receive the Holy Spirit – the Spirit which plants in us seeds of JOY! May that JOY overflow from each and every heart here so that anyone who sees us worshipping will want what we have found, a foretaste of the feast to come – which we can count on being the best party ever!

This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, "Who are you?" He confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, "I am not the Messiah". And they asked him, "What then? Are you Elijah?" He said, "I am not". "Are you the prophet?" He answered, "No". Then they said to him, "Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?" He said, "I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way of the Lord' as the prophet Isaiah said".

Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. They asked him, "Why then are you baptizing if you are neither the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the prophet?" John answered them, "I baptize with water. Among you stands one whom you do not know, the one who is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandal." This took place in Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptizing.

YEAR B - THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT - JOY

ADVENT WREATH CANDLELIGHTING

Leader 1: Last Sunday we lit the second candle in our Advent Wreath, the Candle of Peace. We light it and the Candle of Hope again as we remember that Christ will come again to fulfill all of God's promises to us & to bring to the world everlasting hope & peace.

(Leader 1 lights the 1st and 2nd candles.)

Leader 2: The third candle in our Advent Wreath is the Candle of Joy.

It reminds of the joy that Mary felt
when the angel Gabriel told her that a special child would be born to her –
a child who would save and deliver his people.



Leader 1: God wants us all to have joy.

The angel who announced to the shepherds that Jesus had been born told them: "Do not be afraid. I am bringing you good news of a great joy for all people – for to you is born this day, in the City of David, a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord."

Leader 2: We light this candle to remember that Christ brings the promise of a new life – life in which the blind receive sight, the lame walk, and the prisoners are set free. We light this candle to remind us that Jesus Christ is the bringer of true and everlasting joy.

Leader 1: Let us pray. (a brief silence)


Loving God, we thank you for the joy you bring us through Jesus.

While the Ephraim French Seventh Day Adventist Church that purchased the building from us wanted very much to start a food pantry, they were unable to get permission from CT Food Share who said there were too many pantries in the area. They and we kept praying. Meanwhile a food pantry to which members of our congregation used to deliver food closed, and they began delivering to the Bishop Jean Williams Food Pantry which operated out of a church on Worth St. Three years ago that church building was sold and purchased by Transforming Lives Church. While they knew that as their congregation grew they would eventually need all of the building, they agreed to allow the food pantry to stay for three years. As the end of that time period approached, the Bishop Jean Williams Food Pantry needed a new space. That's when we discovered how God had been using Salem to be an answer to our own prayers and those of the Ephraim French Seventh Day Adventist Church and the Bishop Jean Williams Food Pantry! The pantry is now renting space from the SDA church right here at 3160 Park Avenue! Because of how God has worked, over 500 families came by to pick up food the week of Thanksgiving, and food was delivered to an additional 200 families! Thanks be to God!
