Welcome to Worship!

We want you to feel safe so please know that we have 3 units of the best air cleaner on the market in the sanctuary. (A big thank you to Bill Winter for getting our 3rd one repaired!). There is also one running in the lounge for when we have worship, coffee hour, or adult forums there. Also, you are most welcome to wear a mask at worship if you'd like.

On this Fourth Sunday of Advent we hear how God keeps the promise made to David to give him an everlasting throne. The angel tells Mary that God will give David's throne to her son Jesus. She is perplexed by Gabriel's greeting and by the news of her coming pregnancy, but she is able still to say, "Whatever you want, God!" We who know that Jesus is called king only as he is executed still find it a mystery hard to fathom, but with Mary today we hear the news of what God is up to and say, "Whatever you want, God!"

This year the Fourth Sunday of Advent this year is also Christmas Eve! While some churches are observing Advent 4 in the morning and celebrating Christmas Eve later in the day, Salem's council decided that due to people's schedules, we are observing Advent 4 at worship this morning, but we will have NO Christmas Eve service here at Salem. We encourage you to find the place and time that works best for you and your family and friends to celebrate this holy night!

Save the dates! A Special Congregational Meeting was held on 10/29 at which the congregation voted to close and so we have signed a covenant with the synod that commits us to a specified process of dissolution which will begin in January. There are practical and legal procedures which must be followed, and as the synod leads us through these, we ask your patience and your prayers. On January 7th following worship we will have an adult forum to discuss the possibility of distributing some or all of our financial assets via a foundation. In keeping with the contract we signed, we will NOT be discussing what 501c3 organizations we might wish to support with a legacy gift. That will be discussed at the next congregational meeting which will be conducted by Pastor Maria Hammons, in person on January 14th following worship.

As Salem continues its ministry through April, expenses continue as well. If we are to give the maximum amount of our assets, we are depending on YOU to fulfill your pledge for this year and to continue your giving in 2024. While we can cover expenses from our endowment, we would much rather be able to celebrate the commitment and generosity of each and every one of our members!

As important as your financial contributions are, please remember that YOU are even more important than your money! Showing up for prayer, Bible study, Salem activities, and ecumenical events – either in person or on zoom or on conference calls – is just as impactful and sometimes more impactful than writing a check, so please think about that when you are invited to participate in events listed in these announcement pages!

YEAR B – FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT – LOVE ADVENT WREATH CANDLELIGHTING

Leader 1: Last Sunday we lit the third candle in our Advent Wreath, the Candle of Joy. We light it and the Candles of Hope and Peace again as we remember that Christ will come again to fulfill all of God's promises to us and to bring to the world everlasting hope, peace and joy.

(Leader 2 lights the 1^{st} , 2^{nd} , & 3^{rd} candles.)

Leader 1: The fourth candle in our Advent Wreath is the Candle of Love It reminds us of the love that God has for us.

Leader 2: Jesus shows us God's perfect love,

God's love in human form.

The bible says that

"God so loved the world that he gave his only Son,

so that whoever believes in him should not perish, but have eternal life."

Love is patient, love is kind and envies no one.

Love is never boastful or conceited, rude or selfish.

Love is not quick to take offense, it keeps no records of wrongs,

it does not gloat over other people's troubles,

but rejoices in the right, the good, and the true.

There is nothing that love cannot face,

there is no limit to its faith, to its hope, to its endurance. Love never ends.

Leader 1: We light this candle today to remind us how God's perfect love is found in Jesus.

A READING FROM THE OLD TESTAMENT: 2 Samuel 7:1-11, 16

They and we kept praying. Meanwhile a food pantry to which members of our congregation used to deliver food closed, and they began delivering to the Bishop Jean Williams Food Pantry which operated out of a church on Worth St. Three years ago that church building was sold and purchased by Transforming Lives Church. While they knew that as their congregation grew they would eventually need all of the building, they agreed to allow the food pantry to stay for three years. As the end of that time period approached, the Bishop Jean Williams Food Pantry needed a new space. That's when we discovered how God had been using Salem to be an answer to our own prayers and those of the Ephraim French Seventh Day Adventist Church and the Bishop Jean Williams Food Pantry! The pantry is now renting space from the SDA church right here at 3160 Park Avenue! Because of how God has worked, over 500 families came by to pick up food the week of Thanksgiving, and food was delivered to an additional 200 families! Thanks be to God!
