

# Welcome to Worship!

We want you to feel safe so please know that we have 3 units of the best air cleaner on the market in the sanctuary. (A big thank you to Bill Winter for getting our 3<sup>rd</sup> one repaired!). There is also one running in the lounge for when we have worship, coffee hour, or adult forums there. Also, you are most welcome to wear a mask at worship if you'd like.

This year, the Sundays in Lent lead us to focus on five covenants God makes in the Hebrew Scriptures and to use them as lenses through which to view baptism. Last Sunday we looked at the first covenant, the one God made with Noah. Today we look at the second, the one made with Abraham and Sarah: God's promise to make them the ancestors of many, with whom God will remain in everlasting covenant. Paul says this promise comes to all who share Abraham's faith in the God who brings life into being where there was no life. We receive this baptismal promise of resurrection life in faith. Sarah and Abraham receive new names as a sign of the covenant, and we too get new identities in baptism, as we put on Christ.

## INTRODUCTION TO RECONCILING IN CHRIST SUNDAY



Freed by God's grace, the body of Christ on earth leads a joyous dance of transformation, integrating sexuality and spirituality, justice and mercy.

Through continuous reformation, the Church embraces in holiness and into wholeness people of all sexual orientations and gender identities, strengthening all for authentic, visible, faithful lives.

Dedicated to radical reconciliation, the Church falls into the heart of God's passionate intent, co-creating a world without outcasts, calling all to serve as guests and hosts at God's table of blessing and power.

Reconciling in Christ (RIC) is a program of ReconcilingWorks: Lutherans for Full Participation, begun in 1983 as a way for Lutheran communities of faith – congregations, campus ministries, camps, colleges, synods of the ELCA and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada, and other independent organizations – to answer the inclusive call of the Gospel.

ReconcilingWorks has and continues to open doors, tear down walls, & builds tables for full inclusion and prodigal grace for our church.

Working at the intersection of oppressions, ReconcilingWorks embodies, inspires, advocates and organizes for the acceptance & full participation of people of all sexual orientations & gender identities within the Lutheran communion and its ecumenical and global partners.

After education, discussion, and mutual discernment, Salem voted, in 2010 to approve an Affirmation of Welcome statement and became an official Reconciling in Christ congregation, listed on the RIC web site as a witness to the community and the church at large.

We also include this identification ("A Reconciling in Christ Congregation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America") on the front cover of our weekly bulletin, in our newsletter, and on other publications. The multicolored hearts symbol is another way of identifying ourselves as RIC.

Every year, usually on the last Sunday of January, Salem celebrates Reconciling in Christ (RIC) Sunday, a day set aside to reflect on our call to welcome people of all sexual orientations and gender identities and expressions.

## A READING FROM THE HEBREW SCRIPTURES: Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16

When Abram was ninety-nine years old, the LORD appeared to Abram, and said to him, "I am God Almighty; walk before me, and be blameless. And I will make my covenant between me and you, and will make you exceedingly numerous." Then Abram fell on his face; and God said to him, "As for me, this is my covenant with you: You shall be the ancestor of a multitude of nations. No longer shall your name be Abram, but your name shall be Abraham; for I have made you the ancestor of a multitude of nations. I will make you exceedingly fruitful; and I will make nations of you, and kings shall come from you. I will establish my covenant between me and you, and your offspring after you throughout their generations, for an everlasting covenant, to be God to you and to your offspring after you."

God said to Abraham, "As for Sarai your wife, you shall not call her Sarai, but Sarah shall be her name. I will bless her, and moreover I will give you a son by her. I will bless her, and she shall give rise to nations; kings of peoples shall come from her."

## A READING FROM THE BOOK OF PSALMS: Psalm 22:23-31

You who fear the LORD, give praise! All you of Jacob's line, give glory. Stand in awe of the LORD, all you offspring of Israel. For the LORD does not despise nor abhor the poor in their poverty; neither is the LORD's face hidden from them: but when they cry out, the LORD hears them. From you comes my praise in the great assembly; I will perform my vows in the sight of those who fear the LORD. The poor shall eat and be satisfied, Let those who seek the LORD give praise! May your hearts live forever! All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to the LORD: all the families of nations shall bow before God. For dominion belongs to the LORD, who rules over the nations. Indeed, all who sleep in the earth shall bow down in worship; all who go down to the dust, though they be dead, shall kneel before the LORD. Their descendants shall serve the LORD, whom they shall proclaim to generations to come. They shall proclaim God's deliverance to a people yet unborn, saying to them, "The LORD has acted!" Word of God! Word of Life!

#### A READING FROM THE NEW TESTAMENT: Romans 4:13-25

The promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

For this reason, it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations") — in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become "the father of many nations", according to what was said, "So numerous shall your descendants be." He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. Therefore his faith "was reckoned to him as righteousness." Now the words, "it was reckoned to him", were written not for his sake alone, but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

Word of God! Word of Life! Thanks be to God!

#### A READING FROM THE GOSPELS: Mark 8:31-38

#### You may stand if you so desire.

[Jesus] began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."

## Elizabeth Fedde, deaconess, died 1921 Sunday, February 25, 2024

Born in Norway and trained there as a deaconess, Fedde was asked to come and minister to the poor and to seamen in New York City. She established the Deaconess House in Brooklyn as well as Deaconess Hospital in Minneapolis.

## George Herbert, hymnwriter, died 1633

Friday, March 1, 2024An excellent scholar,Herbert served briefly in the English parliament, then became a parish priest.He was known for devoted care of his parishioners, as well as for writing poetry and hymns, including "Come, my way, my truth, my life."He died at age 40.

# John Wesley, died 1791; Charles Wesley, died 1788; renewers of the church Saturday, March 2, 2024

These brothers led a revival originally intended to remain within the Church of England, one that involved frequent communion and advocacy for the poor.

Except for a brief time in America, they worked in England.

Charles was also a prolific hymn writer.

After their deaths, their work led to the formation of the Methodist Church.
