Welcome to Worship!

We want you to feel safe so please know that we have 3 units of the best air cleaner on the market in the sanctuary. (A big thank you to Bill Winter for getting our 3rd one repaired!). There is also one running in the lounge for when we have worship, coffee hour, or adult forums there. You are most welcome to wear a mask at worship if you'd like. And if you are a worship leader, please know that there are disposable covers for the microphone available as well.

This year, the Sundays in Lent lead us to focus on five covenants God makes in the Hebrew Scriptures and to use them as lenses through which to view baptism. On the first Sunday in Lent ago we looked at the covenant God made with Noah. On the second Sunday we looked at the one made with Abraham and Sarah: God's promise to make them the ancestors of many, with whom God will remain in everlasting covenant. On the third Sunday we looked at the covenant God made with those freed from 400 years of slavery, the gift of the law that they might live well in the promised land. Last week we reflected on a fourth promise in the Hebrew scripture, the promise God makes to Moses that those who look upon the bronze serpent will live. Today we read how God promises Jeremiah that a "new covenant" that will be made in the future: a covenant that will allow all the people to know God by heart. It's not enough to attend worship or serve the needy. It's about a personal relationship with God through Jesus Christ by the power of the Spirit – a relationship that is nurtured by personal and group prayer and Bible study, and results in seeing, hearing, and experiencing God intervening in our daily lives.

Counting today there are just 5 Sundays left for us to gather together as Salem. A READING FROM THE GOSPELS: John 12:20-33

You may stand if you so desire.

Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, "Sir, we wish to see Jesus". Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honor.

"Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say — 'Father, save me from this hour'? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name". Then a voice came from heaven, "I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again". The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, "An angel has spoken to him". Jesus answered, "This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. Now is the judgment of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself". ³³He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.

A native of Britain, Patrick was kidnapped by pirates at age 16 and sold into slavery in Ireland. After a few years, he escaped, returned home, and entered the ministry.

Returning to Ireland, he successfully served as a bishop and missionary there.

Joseph, Guardian of Jesus

Tuesday, March 19, 2024

Though the Bible tells us little about the husband of Jesus' mother Mary,

we know that he was a carpenter or builder by trade.

He is also shown as being devoted both to God and to Mary and Jesus.

It is assumed that he died before Jesus became an adult.

Thomas Cranmer, Bishop of Canterbury, martyr, died 1556

Thursday, March 21, 2024

Cranmer's lasting achievement

is contributing to and overseeing the creation of the Book of Common Prayer, which remains (in revised form) the worship book of the Anglican Communion.

He was burned at the stake under Queen Mary for his support of the Protestant Reformation.

Jonathan Edwards, teacher, missionary to American Indians, died 1758 Friday, March 22, 2024

A Puritan minister in Connecticut, Edwards is remembered as being a great preacher.

Though his most famous sermon focuses on hell, he was more concerned with God's love.

He served both as missionary to the Housatonic people in Massachusetts,

and as president of what was to become Princeton University.
